



HOW TO CLEAN YOUR TIMBER FLOOR

MAINTENANCE AND CLEANING

SWEEPING WITH A BROOM

Sweeping with a broom. Using a soft-bristled broom to sweep up the dirt in your house. Pay close attention to areas that may have collected dirt and rocks, particularly the entrance of the house. These small rocks and pieces of dirt may follow in to the house from shoes and etc. Sweep into a dustpan and dispose of it.

- If dirt and dust remains on the engineered hardwood floor, these will be stuck on the surface and damage the top layer of the timber. Also if rocks are left on the top it will scratch the top layer of the floor.
- It is important to clean the flooring frequently to keep it in good shape and to maximise the flooring's durability and lifespan.
- Sweep your flooring daily

VACUUM THE FLOOR

If you prefer another method of cleaning or want to make sure you cleaned up all dirt from the floor. A vacuum is the best option and set the vacuum to a hardwood flooring mode as it will disable the bristle bar and prevent scratches on the hardwood layer.

- Make sure your vacuum's bristle bar is not turned on, as the damage may be irreversible.
- Vacuum your flooring daily.

MOP WITH A DRY MICROFIBER MOP

A microfiber mop is a very good option for hardwood floors as it attracts and retain dirt and liquids better than a normal mop. Also you won't damage your floor with water.

- Mop your hardwood flooring once a week.

WIPE UP SPILLS IMMEDIATELY

Accidents may occur, but if you've spilled water or any other type of liquid on your engineered hardwood floor, it should be immediately wiped. A permanent stain would occur if you allow liquid to be soaked in by the hardwood floor.

- When cleaning up spills, gently wipe them up as any pressure on the floor may risk pushing the liquid down into the wood and may cause damage.

NEVER EVER USE AN ABRASIVE CLEANING BRUSH

Cleaning products that are touch made out of steel or a wire-bristle. These should never be used on timber floorings. As it will definitely scratch the surface of the floor.
